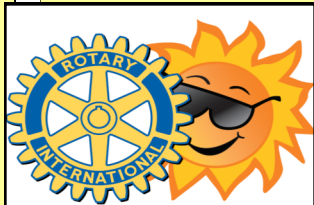

# INTERACT



Interact is the student arm of Rotary International on the high school campus. Their projects are school and community related and further international understanding.

Interact stands for International ACTION. INTERNational because Interact clubs exist in over 110 countries around the world. ACTION because Interactors are doers who want to solve problems and improve the quality of life in their own community as well as around the world.

Sunrise Rotary supports the 50 member BCHS Interact Club all year. Interact meets with NHS 2 times a month, but they also meet weekly for pending projects. In addition, the officers meet with advisor, Leslie Ringen at least once a month in order to determine the agenda and to delegate.

They did a phenomenal job manning the soda and water booth all day and night at WurstFest. The money they make with fundraisers and at events like ours are used to run the club and to give BCHS Student Scholarships separate from our Sunrise Rotary Scholarships.

For all Rotary organizations including Interact, The Four-Way Test is the cornerstone of all action. It has been for years, and it will be in the future. They operate just like any other Rotary Club and their mission is:

Each year, Interact clubs complete at least two community service projects, one of which furthers international understanding and goodwill. Through these efforts, Interactors develop a network of friendships with local and overseas clubs and learn the importance of these goals:

1. Developing leadership skills and personal integrity
2. Demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others
3. Understanding the value of individual responsibility and hard work
4. Advancing international understanding and goodwill

As one of the most significant and fastest-growing programs of Rotary service, with more than 10,000 clubs in 110 countries and geographical areas, Interact has become a worldwide phenomenon. Almost 200,000 young people are involved in Interact.

## WHERE, OH WHERE, DOES OUR MONEY GO!

The funds earned at WurstFest, clearing almost \$50,000 this year, are restricted funds and must go back into the community. High school and Rotary organizations are given funds to help their clubs sustain throughout the year. The board determines the budget and the funds distribution.

When the club receives a thank you for donations they are posted in this newsletter. The organizations who receiving money for work at WurstFest this year are:
